Give Us a King

TEXT: 1 Sam. 8:4-20; 2 Cor. 6:14-7:1; Matt. 16:13-21 INTRODUCTION:

Maybe more than two parts; Intro in AM, Part I in PM; divide Part II over several PMs if necessary (get another reading).

- A. (1 Cor. 10:11-12) RECORDS OF DISOBEDIENCE IN OT FURNISH A WARNING.
 - 1. Against imposing innovations on God's plan.
 - Against rejecting God and His plans.
- B. ISRAEL DID BOTH WHEN THEY WANTED A KING LIKE THE NATIONS AROUND THEM.
- C. WE CAN DO THE SAME THEY DID.

I. ISRAEL WANTS A KING.

- A. HISTORY:
 - 1. God took Israel from slavery and made a covenant with them at Mt. Sinai.
 - a. God was their King(Hosea 13:10-11 KJV)
 - 10 I will be thy king: where is any other that may save thee in all thy cities? and thy judges of whom thou saidst, Give me a king and princes? 11 I gave thee a king in mine anger, and took himaway in my wrath.
 - b He defeated kings: Pharaoh, Og (Bashan), Sihon (Heshbon), and others.
 - Later many kings upon entering Canaan; 31 listed in Josh. 12.
 - 2. Instruction on selecting a king (**Deut. 17:14-17**).
 - 3. Seemingly attempts to establish men as a king over Israel:
 - Moses viewed as king (Deut. 33:1-5).
 - Abimelech made king of Shechem and Beth-millo(Judges 9:6);
 reigned three years (v. 22).
 - 4. Days of the Judges
 - Seeking what was right in man's eyes.
 - (1) Gave up on God as King.
 - (2) Sought their own devices (Judges 17:6).
 - b. Two wicked judges, Samuel's sons (1 Sam. 8:1-3).
 - (1) Joel
 - (2) Abijah
 - (3) Makes you wonder that corrupt leaders come from corrupt people.
 - 5. Samuel's sons evil lives caused the people to want a king (1 Sam. 8:4-6).
- B. THIS TOO WAS A REJECTION OF GOD AND HIS WAYS (1 Sam. 8:7-8).
 - 1. God warned what would come of such a king (1 Sam. 8:10-18).
 - 2. Israel still wants a king (1 Sam. 8:19-22)
 - a. to be like "all the nations...".
 - b. to judge them, go out before them, and fight their battles
 - 3. God had done all this before
 - a. Judged them according to His law.
 - b. Went before them as a pillar of fire and a cloud of smoke.
 - c. Fought their battles, such as Jericho.

II. WHAT DID THEY GET WHEN THEY GOT SAUL?

- A. SAUL WAS NOT ALL BAD.
 - 1. He was the Lord's anointed. He did fight battles and set up altars.
 - 2. He apparently raised a fine son, Jonathan.
- B. SAUL LOOKED LIKE A KING OUTWARDLY(1 Sam. 9:1-2).
- C. THEY HAD A REVIVAL WHEN SAUL WON A BATTLE(1 Sam. 11:14-15).
 - 1. We get excited over something new, until the newness wears off.
 - 2. Careful: something else "new" will come along.
- D. A KING WHO LED THE PEOPLE INTO SIN(1 Sam. 13:1-14; vs. 9-12).
- E. A KING WHO LOST THE KINGDOM(1 Sam. 13:13-14).
- F. A KING WHO LED THE PEOPLE INTO DISOBEDIENCE REGARDING THE AMELEKITES(1 Sam. 15).
 - 1. God's plan was to utterly destroy Amalek (vs. 2-3).
 - 2. Saul and the people spared king Agag and the best of the flocks (vs. 8-9).
 - 3. The Lord's regret (vs. 11).
 - 4. God desired most of all what Saul would not give (vs. 21-23).
 - 5. Saul' knew his sin and confessed (vs. 24-25).
 - 6. The kingdom torn from Saul (vs. 26-28); given to David.
 - 7. Saul still wanted the respect of those whom he led (v. 30).
- G. THEY GOT A KING WHO LOST CONTACT WITH GOD.
 - 1. Samuel would not speak to Saul any more (1 Sam. 15:34-35).
 - 2. God did not answer Saul, who had previously been inspired (1 Sam. 28:6).

- 3. Saul consulted with a spirit medium (1 Sam. 28:3-25).
 - a. Good point: had removed the mediums and spiritists (vs. 3).
 - b. Bad point: in disguise, he consulted a medium (vs. 7-19).
 - Samuel affirmed the kingdom was given to David (vs. 17).
- H. A KING WHO DIED A HUMILIATING DEATH(1 Sam. 31).
 - Losing a battle against the Philistines, Israel's soldiers forced to flee, sons Jonathan, Abinadab and Malachi-shua killed (vs. 1-2).
 - 2. When Saul was wounded he killed himself (vs. 3-5).
 - 3. Saul's decapitated body displayed by the enemy(vs. 9-13).
 - 4. Finally buried by some valiant men.
 - 5. Saul's dishonor was the nations' dishonor.
 - 6. Israel's demand for a king was a rejection of God.

III. WHY WE MAY WANT A KING.

- A. WE ARE NOT NEAR TO THE BEGINNING OF OUR SALVATION. WE ARE GENERATIONS FROM THE TIME OF JESUS, OF THE APOSTLES, OF MIRACLES AND SIGNS, AND INSPIRATION OF THE NEW TESTAMENT.
- B. REJECTING GOD LEAVES US LIKE SHEEP WITHOUT A SHEPHERD.
 - 1. Looking for something to fill the void we imitate the "nations" around us.
 - 2. We too might say, "Give us a king...."
 - 3. We're really saying 'Give us something else, Lord."

 - 1. How much do we want to be like other nations?
 - 2. Are we willing to forsake the pattern? What do we want?

I. A GOD LIKE THE NATIONS AROUND US?

- A. A FATHER IN HEAVEN LIKE THE NATIONS AROUND US.
 - 1. A "nice" God: different than that of the OT--too warring, love only with no punishments. "Celestial Santa Claus." (Rom. 11:22; Heb. 10 31).
 - 2. The Mormon God, flesh and bone, once like us(John 4:24; Job 9:32).
 - 3. Not one who changes with whim or public pressure (Psa. 50:21; Mal. 3:6).
 - 4. New Age god, the Hindu god, nature. God's to whom we need not answer.
 - 5. Absent god, dead, doesn't exist, disinterested(Rom. 1:20-21).
 - 6. **Heb. 11:6**. We need to believe and obey the God of the Bible.
 - a. One God who made us all(Eph. 4:6; Acts 17:24-29).
 - b. Who calls us to repent and will judge all by Jesus Christ (vs. 17:30-31).
 - 7. Careful lest we seek a God like the nations around us.
- B. A JESUS LIKE THE NATIONS AROUND US.
 - $1. \hspace{1.5cm} \hbox{Who won't condemn anyone, approving all things done with good conscience.} \\$
 - 2. A Jesus who was merely a man, albeit a good man, a great philosopher.
 - 3. A Jesus who did not rise from the dead.
 - 4. Matt. 24:5, 24, 2 Cor. 11:4. We need the Jesus of the Bible.
 - a. Who died for our sins and was risen for our hope (1 Pet. 1:3; 2:24).
 - b. Who demands obedience and will judge(John 14:15; Matt. 7:22-23).
 - c. Who criticized the religiously comfortable(Luke 6:46).
 - d. Who condemned leaders who were innovators (Matt. 15:1-9, 13-14).
 - e. Who has all authority (Matt. 28:18; Col. 3:17).
 - f. He is the "one Lord" (Eph. 4:6; John 14:6; 10:1)...
- C. A HOLY SPIRIT LIKE THE NATIONS AROUND US.

- 1. A mystical non-being spirit behind every living thing (Eph. 4:30).
- 2. The impersonal power or "life-force" of God(Matt. 28:19; John 16:13).
- 3. One that reaches from beyond the Scriptures to instruct us (2 Tim. 3:16-17; 1 Pet. 1:3; Jude 3).
- 4. The Spirit who pushes aside the message of the gospel (1 Cor. 1:21-24).
- 5. The Calvinist Spirit who take free will (Rom. 10:17; Rev. 22:17).
- 6. **2 Cor. 11:4**. The truth about the Spirit is important.
 - a. His function(John 16:8).
 - b. The truth he reveals(1 Cor. 2:12-13).

II. A BIBLE LIKE THE NATIONS AROUND US?

- A. NEED TO BE DISCERNING ABOUT NEW TRANSLATIONS.
 - 1. But I'd say beware of paraphrases like the Living Bible.
 - 2. Some translations show doctrinal bias(NIV, NWT).
 - 3. Notes in "study Bibles" are good, but reflect background of editors.
- B. SOME HAVE OFFERED OTHER "HOLY BOOKS."
 - 1. Book of Mormon 6. Mahayna (Buddhist)
 - 7. I Ching
 - 2. Science and Health with a Key to the Scriptures
- 8. Tao Te Ching
- 3. Koran
- 9. Gnostic Writings and Gospels
- 4. Bhagavad-Gita
- 10. The Apocrypha.
- 5. Book of the Dead
- C. OTHERS HAVE EDITED THE SCRIPTURE
 - 1. Reader's Digest, leaving out many "boring" parts.
 - 2. Jesus Project with colorful notes trying to guess at what parts are Jesus or his disciples, as if none of it is inspired.
 - 3. Welhausian Theory and the Polychrome Bible a denial.
 - 4. Still others offer a Creed book to establish Scripture.
 - 6. Some simply discount or eliminate what they don't like.
 - 5. The Bible equips us for every good work (2 Tim. 3:16).
 - 6. Is God's final word(Jude 3; Heb. 7:27; 10:10).

III. A GOSPEL LIKE THE NATIONS AROUND US?

- A. REMEMBER, NEEDING ANOTHER GOSPEL IS NOT A REJECTION OF GOSPEL PREACHERS. IT IS A REJECTION OF GOD(1 Sam. 8:7).
- B. SOME WANT A **SOCIAL** GOSPEL.
 - 1. Pointing less to heaven than to heaven-on-earth.
 - 2. Making the church the body for social changes: stop racism, feed and clothe the poor, educate children, bring hospitals to poor countries.
 - 3. Romans 14:17. John 6:26-35.
- C. SOME WANT A FAITH-ONLY GOSPEL.
 - 1. Going to heaven is dependent only upon wanting to go(Luke 13:24).
 - 2. What does the Bible say?(James 1:22; 2:14-24; Matt. 7:21).
- D. AN "OTHERS-CAN-ACT-TO-SAVE-US" GOSPEL.
 - 1. Parents have babies "baptized" (actually sprinkled).
 - 2. Mormon "baptize" to save the dead.
- E. THE GOSPEL WE NEED IS THE GOSPEL JESUS AND THE APOSTLE'S TAUGHT(2 Cor. 2:2; Matt. 28:18-20; Mark 16:15-16).
- F TO PREACH OR RECEIVE ANOTHER GOSPEL WILL CUT YOU OFF FROM GOD(Gal. 1:8-9).

IV. A CHURCH LIKE THE NATIONS AROUND US?

- A. WHAT SOME WANT. 1. Some want/have:
 - 1. Emphasis on social life, special days and events, potlucks, teams, etc.
 - 2. Special non-biblical holy days: Christmas, Ash Wednesday, Lent, Easter
 - 3 Unbiblical ways of raising funds: bake sales, garage sales, running businesses, schools, bingo or other gambling events, carnivals, selling books and tapes calling funds received "donations."
 - 4. Unscriptural worship: instrumental music, burning incense or candles, mass as a re-sacrifice of Jesus, worship accepted if offered by a priest
 - 5. Unscriptural organization: earthly headquarters, women elders (also women preachers), bishops, cardinals, missionary society, sponsoring churches.
- B. WE ARE TO HOLD THE PATTERN(2 Tim. 1:13).
- C. TO IMITATE THOSE AROUND US IS TO FORSAKE GOD'S PATTERN (Heb. 8:5).
- D. WE NEED THE CHURCH OF CHRIST'S DESIGN, THAT...
 - Calls itself by terms (names) in the scriptures. Let's not use denominational names are wrong(1 Cor. 1:1-13).

- 2. Is built on Christ(Matt. 16:18; 1 Cor. 3:11).
- 3. Subject to Christ (Eph. 1:22-23; 5:24), not making its own laws and creeds.
- 4. Is pure (**Eph. 5:27**).
 - a. Teaching and practicing righteousness
 - b. Restoring those who sin(Gal. 6:1).
 - c. Putting some out occasionally(2 Thess. 3:6; Rev. 2:1-2; Rom. 16:17-18).
- E. TO FORSAKE THE PATTERN TO BE LIKE THOSE AROUND US AND PLEASE THEM IS TO FORSAKE GOD ALTOGETHER (Gal. 1:10).

V. A PREACHER LIKE THE NATIONS AROUND US?

- A. WHAT SOME WANT.
 - 1. Preacher is Pastor, an administrator.
 - 2. A do it all. 40 hours in regular office hours or visit everyone or both.
 - 3. Youth or other specialty ministers.
 - 4. A "Charismatic" (in the new sense) Preacher, a **Showman**.
 - 5. Well liked and respected by civic leaders.
 - 6. Preacheritis, only one will do(1 Cor. 2:4-9; 3:21-23).
 - 7. A soft man with soft words? (Matt. 11:7-9; Jer. 5:30-31; 8:8-12; 6:16).
- B. WE NEED MORE MEN LIKE PAUL.
 - 1. A description of Paul
 - (1 Cor. 2:1-3; 2 Cor. 10:10; Gal. 4:12-15; 1 Cor. 4:9-14).
 - 2. What God saw.
 - a. Fierce persistence(Acts 20:18-31).
 - b. Unrelenting courage(Acts 20:20, 27-27).
 - c. Commitment of love(Rom. 9:1-3; 2 Cor. 12:15).
 - d. A clear perspective of purpose (Gal. 1:10; Col. 3:1-2).
 - e. Unswerving conviction(2 Tim. 1:12; 4:6-8, 16-18).
 - 3. Paul was the off-scouring of the world! Could we support one like that?
 - 4. You pray that I can be an imitator of Paul as he is of Christ (Phil 4:9).

VI. A MORALITY LIKE THE NATIONS AROUND US?

- A. 2 Cor. 4:3-4. BLINDED BY THE GOD OF THIS WORLD.
 - Dancing, social drinking, smoking or other drug use, divorce and remarriage for "any cause," gambling, etc.
 - These vices are have long been in the world, have crept into the denominations and are well on their way in the church.
 - 3. A worldly, grab all the gusto attitude overcomes faith(Gal. 5:16-21).
 - a. 1 Cor. 6:6-9; Eph. 5:3-5. Shall not inherit the kingdom.
 - b. Will Israel's condemnation be ours? (Judges 21:25).
- B. MORALITY INVOLVES MAKING CHOICES.
 - 1. What is most important to you? (Matt. 6:19-21).
 - 2. That will determine your Master(vs. 22-24; 1 John 2:15).
 - 3. **2** Cor. 6:14, 17; Rom. 6:12-13.

VII. A HOPE LIKE THE NATIONS AROUND US?

- A. SOME HAVE HOPE
 - 1. to retire and move to FL or Arizona.
 - 2. in reincarnation, getting better karma each time through. New Age!
 - 3. just to end life's weary travels (Sadducees?). Which is no hope at all.
- B. SOME HAVE A FALSE HOPE.
 - 1. Salvation without faith or obedience (Heb. 11:6; 2 Thess. 1:7-9).
 - 2. Reward here on the earth
 - a. Matt. 5:12; Matt. 6:20; Matt 19:21; 1 Pet. 1:4.
 - b. 2 Pet. 3:10-12.
 - 3. Expect a miracle(1 Cor. 1:21-24; Matt. 16:4; 1 Cor. 15:19).
- C. THERE IS ONLY ONE HOPE(Eph. 4:4).
 - 1. Ours is a hope of salvation (1 Thess. 5:8).
 - 2. A hope of eternal life (Titus 1:2; 3:7).
 - 3. The Hope of Israel(Acts 23:6; 24:14-15; 26:6-8, 22-23; 28:20).
 - 4. Is this your hope?
 - 5. Will you find it asking for something from the denominations around us?

CONCLUSION:

- A. WE CAN BE LIKE THE NATIONS AROUND US.
 - 1. Easier to convert people to Christ
 - 2. Easier to keep people faithful to Christ
- B. THOSE WHO PREACH A DIFFERENT GOSPEL ARE ANATHEMA.
